Welcome to Wyandot County!

Located in northwest Ohio at the crossroads of US 30 and US 23, Wyandot County is a rural treasure of both yesterday and today. The countryside abounds with fields of grain during the growing season, wooded areas, and well-kept homesteads. Crops grown are corn, wheat and soybeans, but other fields reap hay and silage and support the grazing of cattle and sheep and raising hogs.

Artifacts have been found in the Indian Trail Caverns that carbon-date to around 12,000 years in age, so some inhabitation of the county has been here for centuries. Ancestors of the Wyandot Indians had lived in the (NE) Lake Huron region of Canada. Defeated by the Iroquois about 1650, some came to Ohio and settled near the Sandusky Bay. Wyandot settlements had been established in Wyandot County by the mid-1760's.

Possibly one of the most historical counties in Ohio, Wyandot County was the site of the last battle of the Revolutionary War. This battle ended with the capture of Col. Wm. B. Crawford and his men. Col. Crawford was burned at the stake along the Tymochtee Creek, southeast of Carey. He remains the only U.S. Army officer to have died in this manner.

The Wyandots were forced to move West in 1843, leaving behind the Mission Church and cemetery, the mill built for their use by the US government, their villages, and memories of the cooperative spirit between them and the early European settlers to the county. These physical reminders of the past blend with the present day for an enjoyable and relaxing visit. Come and lose yourself in our early history, eat in one of our many wonderful and hometown eateries, and visit with our friendly welcoming citizens.

Wyandot County Communities

A beautiful mostly rural arena awaits those who visit. With many designated highways, it's not hard to get here (US 30, 23, 67,53 and the Lincoln Highway Byway plus many well traveled state routes). Historically it was the last home of the Wyandot Indians prior to their move to Kansas and Oklahoma. Vestiges of their tenure here are the Indian Mill and the Mission Church as well as gravesites. Most prominent is the newly restored Wyandot County Courthouse, located on the square in Upper Sandusky, that preserves much of our heritage. Visits to the area change with the seasons: the soft green of newly arising crops in the spring, bountiful fields of deep luscious greens to soft browns in the summer, the rising dust of the harvesting of crops in the fall, and the fallowed fields of winter often make a winter wonderland when covered with snow. Terrain, that is mostly flat to gently rolling, make this a haven for the avid bicyclist. With about 22,000 residents, we are a small but vital part of the state's history and economy.

UPPER SANDUSKY

City of Upper Sandusky. County Seat of Wyandot County. Located on the head waters of the Sandusky River which flows north to Lake Erie (thus "upper," as in "up river"), known as the last Ohio home of the Wyandot Indians. Historic? Yes. Today it's a vibrant hometown to its 6000+ residents, with its great restaurants, beautiful well used parks, bike trail, active churches, friendly citizens and a great downtown featuring: OSU merchandise, candy shoppe, hardware, coffee shop, children's clothing, jewelry, crafts, antiques and quaint boutiques; could you ask for more?

CAREY

The Village of Carey is named after one of the area's first settlers and an Ohio politician (Ohio General Assembly and U.S. House of Representatives), Honorable Judge John Carey. Attractions include the Basilica and National Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation and the nearby Indian Trail Caverns. Several large industries located here serve a wide range of customers, those being National Lime and Stone Co., TransGlobal, and Vaughn Industries. A unique experience is shopping at "Art Connections," an industry of artisans with disabilities. A friendly business community of local shops welcomes visitors.

HARPSTER

The village of Harpster was founded in 1876 by David Harpster and John Wood. Originally named Fowler City, it was renamed for Harpster after he donated the land for the railroad to be built through the village, bringing prosperity to the village. Residents take pride in upkeeping Lewis Park, a great place for gatherings and children. An annual potluck picnic at the park brings present and former residents together to reminisce.

KIRBY

Laid out in 1854, Kirby is a busy village as it is home to a lumber company, a carpet and flooring business, a grain elevator and a restaurant most noted for its pizzas, the Blue Room. Located just minutes off US 53, it is also noted for its annual St. Mary's Festival with an adult's "night out" and a day of family fun making it a favorite with local and not so local residents.

MARSEILLES

Marseilles has an interesting history as "the biggest little town in the world." Settled in 1821 and located on an old Indian trail where French fur traders came to buy their wares, it supported large mills that utilized power from the river circling the village, and was noted for being an Indian gauntlet ground. Now home to only one business, the community actively supports its community park.

With its location adjacent to the Killdeer Wildlife Sanctuary, a haven for wildlife and bird watchers, it can still boast of being the biggest little town in the world!



McCUTCHENVILLE

An incorporated village in northern Wyandot County on US 53, this village offers a lot to the visitors: a restaurant, a hardware store, a painting business, churches, its citizens and the historic McCutchen Overland Inn (see SITES for info).

NEVADA

The village of Nevada, which was named after the then newly admitted state of Nevada, is pronounced with the long "a." Platted in 1852, its location along the railroad made it a thriving community with hotels and businesses. Now its location adjacent to US 30, makes it an easily accessible, friendly community for its residents.

SYCAMORE

Named after the Sycamore Creek, the village of Sycamore was founded in 1842. While a mostly farming community, many smaller businesses are located here. The Mohawk Community Library is a vibrant part of the community and hosts many events for the young and the "not so young" citizens throughout the year. The Mohawk Museum preserves the history of Sycamore and small communities in the area.

WHARTON

The village of Wharton, originally established as Whartonburg, was a beautiful clearing along the I.B. 7 W.R. Railroad. Their firm history revolves around the "Wharton Shake," the handshake that cemented many business deals and as a Sunday church ritual seemed to convey the wishing of blessings of health and prosperity. Today that still holds true in this small residential community.





Crawford Monument

MATERIAL STATES OF THE STATES

Original monument was erected in 1877 in memory of Col. Wm. B. Crawford who had led the Sandusky Expedition to quiet the Indian skirmishes in the West. Crawford was captured and brought back to the spot near where the monument stands. Crawford was burned at the stake. Crawford remains the only US Army officer ever to die in this manner. In 1994 a new monument was erected and dedicated in

Ritchey Cemetery. Located 5 miles south of Carey on State Highway 199 and .9 mile east of the village of Crawford on County Highway 29. Wyandot County Historical Society 419-294-3857.

Tarhe Monument

Erected in memory of the great Wyandot Chief Tarhe, the Crane, who led his people in peace. He was one of the signers of the Treaty of Greenville and was considered the sachem of all Indian tribes. At his death in 1818, leading chiefs of the surrounding states gathered and mourned his loss. This was considered the largest gathering of leaders from the Indian nations in the Great Lakes and Ohio



Valley areas. Located 4 miles north of Upper Sandusky off State Highway 67 N on County Highway 37 (near the Parker Covered Bridge).

Lincoln Highway Marker - SE corner East Wyandot Ave. and South Fourth St., Upper Sandusky. Original marker from the concrete bridge where the old Lincoln Highway (LHW) crossed the Sandusky River.

Lincoln Highway Original Brick Road - East Wyandot Ave., Upper Sandusky, just east of Willson's Grocery. State marker.

BiCentennial Park - North Sandusky Ave., Upper Sandusky. Funded locally, monuments have been erected honoring veterans of the Vietnam War, Korean War, and World War II.

Wildlife Areas

Killdeer Plains Wildlife Area

Located between Harpster and Marseilles (11 miles southwest of Upper Sandusky) ODNR operates over 8,000 acres that feature public hunting and fishing. Large



portions of the area are set aside as prairie/marsh wildlife refuges. The area is home to deer, a variety of waterfowl,


